IT'S BEGINNING TO LOOK A LOT LIKE CHRISTMAS!

I always get excited this time of year! Though the warm weather lately has seemed a bit strange, there is still a festive air around us. Though I grew up in a home where Christ was often spoken of, we still did not observe a "religious holiday" on December 25. We did thank God for all the good food we had and we were cognizant that the idea of giving to others first came from God. He is the Great Giver.

Through the years I have observed the practices and teachings of others concerning Christmas.

Though the date and many of the trappings come from a pagan origin, I am sure that people do not intend any of the pagan ramifications as they remember the birth of Jesus on that day. Factually, we do not know the date (nor even the year) of Jesus' birth. The date, December 25, has a 1/365 chance of being the right date. Lack of Desire by: A. C. Quinn

Paul expresses, in simple terms, the meaning of the term "desire" in his letter to the Romans: "Brethren, my hearts desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved" (Romans 10:1). The salvation of his Jewish countrymen was his most ardent wish. He really wanted to see them saved. He had a longing--an insatiable craving for that outcome, and his works throughout his life attest to that desire.

The Lord's church suffers immensely today for lack of desire in those who should be the stalwarts in the faith. For instance, it is not a matter of not having qualified men to serve the church as elders. It is a matter of men not having the desire, which is a qualification in itself (I Tim. 3:1). Too many men just don't want to serve.

The same is applicable to teaching and preaching. Capable people just don't want to do it. They don't have the desire (I Pet. 2:2). Failure to give, attend services, and all the other things that Christians should do have the same underlying problem—a lack of desire. To the contrary, God's people are to be peculiar and zealous of good works (Titus 2:14). A lack of desire kills initiative for all future growth of the church and her mission (Mark 1:15-16).

Life is what you put into it. It is what you dream and how hard you work to make those dreams come true. What you make of your life is no one's responsibility but yours.

In 1974 doctors discovered that Quincy Jones had two brain aneurysms.

"Please, God, not now," he cried. Quincy had played trumpet for years, and he still had too many dreams to let it all end now. One of America's top black jazz artists, he had worked with Lionel Hampton's band and eventually formed his own group. Quincy had worked on Broadway and still had a promising career ahead of him as a trumpeter when medical problems forced him to face the reality that he could not return to his beloved instrument. He would have to apply his musical talents elsewhere.

Quincy Jones is a perfectionist. He channeled his formidable musical ability into composing, directing, and producing, and soon began to attract the attention of some of the entertainment industry's most influential people. His attention to detail is legendary. He works and works to make the music just right, then works some more to see if he can make it perfect. Jones produced and conducted the "We are the World" recording, wrote the score for Roots and The Color Purple, and also produced Thriller with Michael Jackson, one of the most successful record albums of all time. He has been nominated for sixty-eight Grammy Awards and has won nineteen. Stephen Spielberg summed up Jones's intensity of life in a Sixty Minutes interview: "He takes a minute and finds two minutes of enrichment out of one minute of living."

"I recommend that you take care of the minutes, for the hours will take care of themselves." —Chesterfield You think about it!
