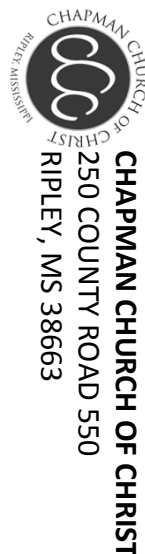

"ARE YOU A FOOL?" by Dalton Key

The greater host of humanity lives solely for the present. Perhaps half as many give occasional, fleeting thought to what may come tomorrow. Each generation rears its thinkers, its planners, who think in terms of a lifetime, and at times may even look philosophically at the hem of history's garment. But few individuals, scarcely any of any generation, are wise enough to look beyond today and tomorrow to the immeasurable expanse of eternity.

The rich farmer of Luke's twelfth chapter could see nothing beyond his short-lived life of flesh. His myopic vision saw no farther than his bulging, overburdened barns. He contemplated retirement but ignored eternity. And God called him a fool.

The inspired James describes this same type of man, the same type of fool, in his fourth chapter: "Come now, you who are saying, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to a certain city, and spend a year there; we will trade, and make a profit.' You do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? You are a vapor which briefly appears, and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, 'If the Lord wills, we will live, and do this or that.'" (vs. 13-15, McCord.)

What a waste to hone our health, primp and paint our bodies, prepare and pad our retirement accounts – all to benefit this frail life of flesh – while sadly ignoring the undeniable reality of eternity!

Would God call you a fool?

Turning the Knob Aaron Veyon

The story is told of a boy who came home from school one day and noticed that all the vehicles were gone. Realizing that no one was home he just sat on the steps. Soon it began to rain and he got soaked. When his mother came home she asked him why he didn't go into the house. He said, "You weren't home, how could I?" She said, "Honey, the house was unlocked. Did you try turning the knob?"

Sometimes we make things more difficult than they need to be simply by failing to be observant. This is especially true with regard to the gospel of Christ. Holding a closed Bible, a young man asked a visiting preacher, "How in the world could anyone understand the Bible?" The preacher immediately responded, "Did you ever try opening your Bible in an effort to understand it?" The young man quipped, "I don't need to. My preacher tells us what's in it – but I still don't understand it." That is truly sad, for if the young man had searched the Scriptures himself he could have found what he was looking for (cf. 2 Tim. 3:14-17). Jesus said, "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you" (Matt. 7:7).

Friends, the door of the gospel is unlocked. Try turning the knob.

1 John 1:7 – The Cleansing Fountain BY WAYNE JACKSON

In the Old Testament, Zechariah foretold a time when a fountain would be opened to the house of David for sin and for uncleanness (Zechariah 13:1). The reference, of course, was to the shedding of the blood of Christ and the redemptive effect of that divine offering under the New Testament economy.

While many Bible students are aware of the fact that the blood of Jesus is applied to their souls in their initial obedience to the gospel, which occurs at the point of baptism (Acts 22:16), some do not realize that the Lord's cleansing blood continues to function on their behalf as they struggle with sin in their Christian lives.

John speaks to this very point. He says "if we walk in the light. . . the blood of Jesus. . . cleanses us from all sin" (1 John 1:7).

There are several important notes that you can make in connection with this passage. First, the promise of the passage is conditional. Circle the term "if" and note that point. Second, the verb "walk" is a present tense form, denoting a consistent pattern of life. It represents the activity of one who is sincerely striving, on a sustained basis, to serve God. It does not suggest that he is perfect, but that he is trying diligently. Third, the "walking" must be "in the light," i.e., in harmony with the revealed will of God, the New Testament. Fourth, if this habitual walking in the light is devoutly pursued, the Lord's blood will keep on cleansing (present tense – sustained activity) the child of God. Implied in all of this, of course, is the fact that the erring Christian must repent of, and confess, his transgressions. Make some marginal notes reflecting these points.
