It is on this picture that I wish to focus for a few moments.

In a sunset I see the end of one day and the glimpse of the next. I see the hope of rest from labor, which can only be hoped for by one who has been laboring. One day, the sun will set for the last time on each of our lives, and the beauty of that sunset will be decided by what we did with the life we lived before it. How brilliant will your final sunset be?

And then we wonder why life seems to have no meaning, no purpose, no substance. Without a genuine hunger and thirst for righteousness we will never be filled.

Don't you think it's about time we started putting first things first?
