WHERE ARE THOSE WHO WILL WORK? Mark Lindley

It is a great blessing to live in the United States of America. This county is often touted the "land of opportunity." Our borders are often breached by those who want a chance to live where there is freedom, and the opportunity to seek employment in an open market. The freedoms enjoyed here and opportunities for work make this country very appealing to those who do not enjoy such privileges. Countless individuals of other nations would love to come to America to work.

However, there is an everincreasing number of Americans who
choose not to work. Employers have a
difficult time finding those who will work.
Businesses often close early because there
are no workers. Signs advertising higher
starting pay and increased salaries are
often ignored by those who choose not to
work. All of these things are alarming.
America did not become the greatest
country of the world by idleness.

Further, these things are alarming to Christians because idleness is against Biblical principles. God demands all who can to work. "For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work, neither should he eat" (II Thessalonians 3:10). "Let him that stole steal no more: but rather let him labour, working with *his* hands the thing which is good, that he may have to give to him that needeth" (Ephesians 4:28). It is not God's will that able-bodied people wait for a hand-Out from the government. God requires people to work!

But there are those who offer excuses for not working. Solomon anticipated excuses which might be offered: "The sluggard will not plow by reason of the cold; therefore shall he beg in harvest, and have nothing" (Proverbs 20:4). "The slothful man saith, There is a lion without, I shall be slain in the streets" (Proverbs 22:13). Whether it is "too cold," the fear of "a lion in the street," or some other flimsy excuse, the lazy, indolent man always seems to have justification for not working.

Where are those today like Paul? The apostle Paul was one who "labored night and day," not only in preaching the gospel, but also in making tents (I Thessalonians 2:9; Acts 18:3). Where are those today like Jesus? Jesus worked. He was referred to as "the carpenter" (Mark 6:3). It is likely he learned this trade from his father, Joseph. Jesus was constantly working in teaching, preaching, serving, healing, and helping (Luke 2:49; John 4:34; 9:4). He stands as an example for us today.

Scripture declares that the one who will not "provide for his own" has denied the faith and is "worse than an infidel" (I Timothy 5:8). An infidel is one who does not believe. The Scriptures offer no hope for the unbeliever. However, one who will not work to provide for his own is "worse" than an unbeliever. Many of our day will not work, and are, therefore, worse than an unbeliever! Very sad and tragic!

May God continue to show patience and favor toward our great country! May those who live here rise up and promote the God-given responsibility and honor of working!
